Information Please

This is a book full of data - about our state and our communities. It's geared toward the candidates who seek to lead Louisiana, and the voters who will elect them. Why? Because if we are to make decisions about how we will move forward as a state, we need information about where we stand now.

This book is more than just a collection of statistics. It is a picture of our state. Many of the individual data points are interesting by themselves, but follow them through from beginning to end and something much larger emerges - a snapshot of where Louisiana really stands. The information in this book points to the areas where we need to focus as a state, and the foundations upon which we can build. It suggests to candidates the things they should be talking about in this election, and to voters the kinds of questions they should be asking. It's information we all should have.

A Critical Election

CABL hopes to make this year's gubernatorial election one about substance. Through our nonpartisan *People's Agenda* election project, we will work to connect voters and candidates on the issues that are most important to Louisiana - through statewide voter surveys, candidate questionnaires, issues briefings and gubernatorial debates. Today, Louisiana is approaching a fork in the road. It is important that we ask ourselves which direction we want to go. Are we committed to doing the things we must to progress, or are we satisfied with where we are? This year we will decide.

It is CABL's hope that the information in this book will help candidates and voters develop an objective and accurate view of Louisiana's condition. Our larger goal, and that of *The People's Agenda*, is to encourage a substantive debate on what all the information shows are our state's most pressing issues.

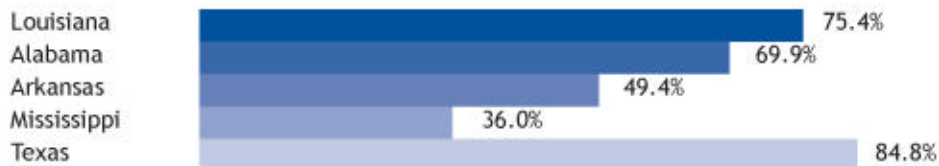

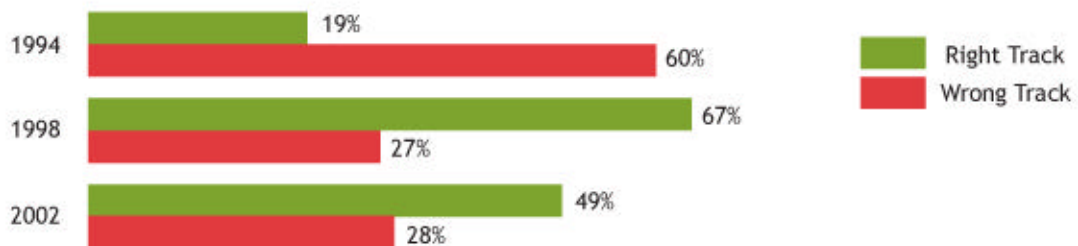

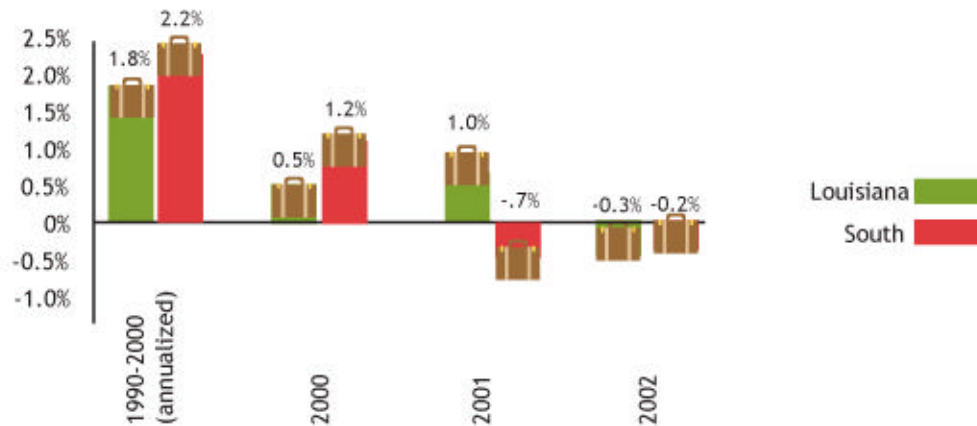

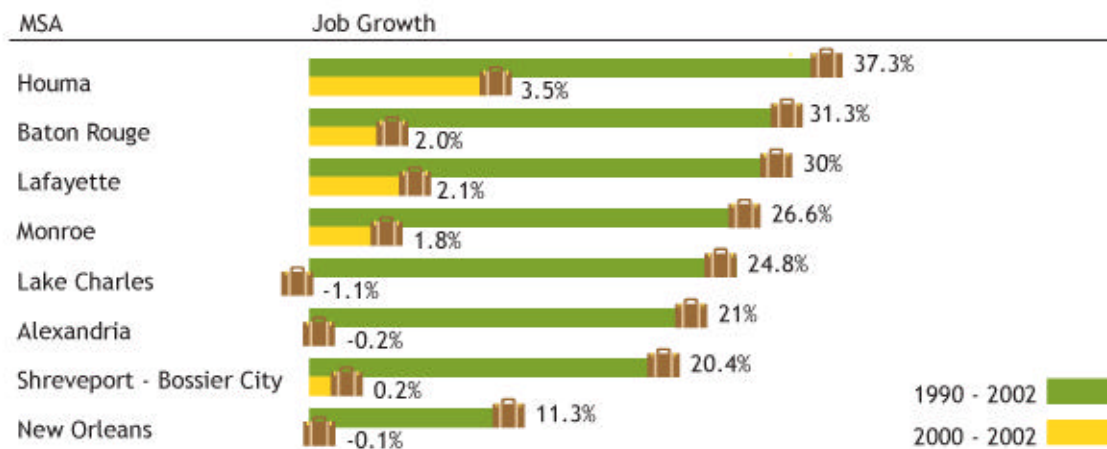

In terms of tonnage handled, Louisiana has five of the top twelve ports in the U.S.



In 2000, Louisiana led the nation in terms of the tonnage of exports leaving our ports. Louisiana was third in the nation in terms of export value. This translated into 326.7 billion pounds of goods exported through Louisiana worth more than \$24 billion.

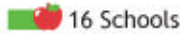

Update!

Schools are rated on a two-year cycle. In the 2000-2001 cycle, 69.6% of K-8 schools met or exceeded their two-year growth target for performance. Today, halfway through the current rating cycle, only 42% of K-8 schools and 38% of high schools have met at least half of their two-year growth target. This means that many of our already low-performing schools are in danger of serious failure.

Altogether, Louisiana spends 53% of its State General Funds on Pre-K-12 public education and post-secondary education.

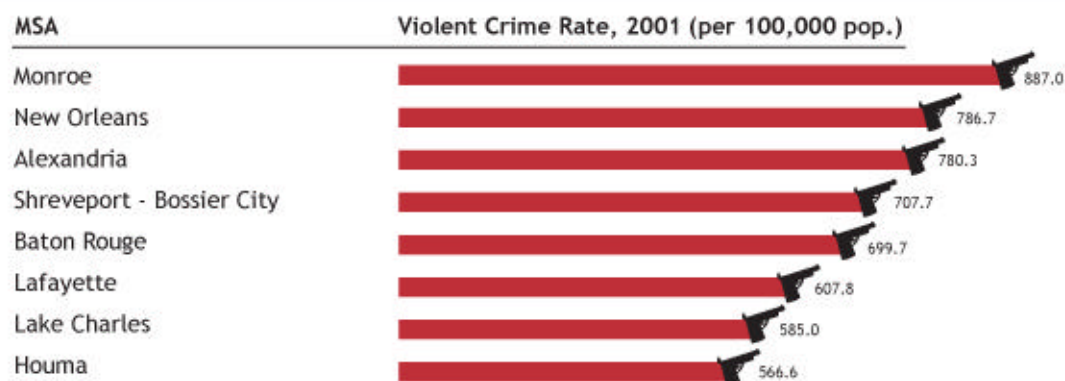

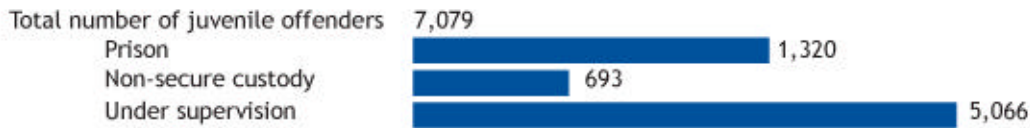

Louisiana's Wetlands Are America's Wetlands

Forty percent of U.S. wetlands are in Louisiana.



Eighty percent of the coastal wetland loss in the entire U.S. occurs in Louisiana.

Louisiana's 6.5 million acres of wetlands are the largest in the nation.

Louisiana loses 25-35 square miles of wetlands per year. Since 1930, the amount of wetlands lost in Louisiana is greater than the size of Rhode Island.

We Are Generous.

According to the Catalogue for Philanthropy, Louisiana citizens are fifth in the nation in the percentage of their earnings given to charity.

In 2000, Louisiana led the nation in money spent for historic preservation.

Louisiana citizens and businesses contribute nearly \$90 million annually to the arts.



We Have a Literary Tradition.

Twelve writers with ties to Louisiana have won the Pulitzer Prize for literature.

We Have a Musical Tradition.

A total of 35 artists with ties to Louisiana have won Grammy awards in the categories of jazz, blues, folk, country and gospel.
